

TECH TIPS

This month my tech tip covers oil filters. Yes, I know many of you know that your local Alfa dealer has what you need, but just suppose you're out in the sticks and you're due for an oil change. So, with this listing you can go to a local parts store and can get a suitable replacement. I would recommend that you put a spare oil filter gasket in your first aid kit as the filter doesn't come with a gasket that fits your Alfa. These are for 1600's and 1750's only.

what would you do if some night you were on your way somewhere and your throttle cable snapped? Suggestion-go to your Alfa dealer and buy a spare throttle for \$3.50 and put it in a safe place in your first aid kit. Two 14 mm wrenches will change it. If you don't have a spare throttle cable and your only one breaks, take two or three strands of the broken one and make a make-shift cable strong enough not to pull apart and reattach at both ends and test before driving anywhere. Drive carefully. If the make-shift cable breaks, use more strands from the old cable.





