Long Beach Grand Prix-The Alfa powered Brabhams had more than their share of diffulcities in the streets of Long Beach the first three days of this month. First the cars and engines were nearly siezed by U.S. Customs because they were declared at about 10% of their actual value (this is not a unique situation), most of the F1 teams were guilty of the same sort of nuisance, trying to save money on import bonds.

When the cars came out for practice on Friday John Watson's #7 was "blackflagged" for dragging the transmission support and left side exhaust, shooting a fearsome spray of sparks out the back when the wing loading pressed the car down at high speed. It was determined by officals that this did not represent a hazzard to other cars and, since they had informed the team, it was team manager Bernie Eccelstone's problem. The problem went unfixed! This example set the tone for the whole Brabham effort. One can't help but wonder why they bother to show up. Perhaps if the cars and engines weren't seperate "sub-teams" the buck wouldn't get passed so readily.

The official disqualification of Watson's #7 was due to the crew's working on the car with tools on the course (not in the pit). To his credit Hans Stuck drove the #8 very well considering he hadn't even sat in the car before Friday practice. He retired the car with all the brake fluid boiled out of the brakes. Both Brabhams pitted early in the race to bleed their brakes and Watson had to replace a wheel, but in the first lap monkey business inspired by anouther shunt between Reutemann and Brambilla.

Enough GP- crank up those Alfas and lets see if WE can't show the prancing horse set some class at Willow Springs April 23rd! See you there!!

Slaloms & Such

March 20 was the first day of spring, and the day of the first championship slalom remember? The weather at Lion Country Safari was just right, and the course was well laid out. Timed runs were averaging between 75 and 85 seconds, which is not too shabby for the length of the course. There were about 150 entries for this event, but unfortunatly not a single one from AROSC. I hoped to get my spider ready in time, but unforseen complications prevented my participation. I had hoped that a few members might be interested enough to drop by to see what it was all about, but to the best of my knowledge, no one showed up, so I pretended that a giraffe, and an equally curious ostrich that watched the event for the better part of an hour, (from a distance) to explain the details either at the regular were really AROSC members!

At the March meeting it was suggested that there were new members that were not familiar with the slal oms. I will attempt to give some of the basics of this type of event. To start with, the official definition as given in the SCC-SCC Slalom Code book is "a low-speed driving skill contest in which each car is separately timed over a short, clearly defined course with the elapsed time and penalities for course deviations being the determining factors for awards." SCC-SCC is the Southern California Council of Sports Car Clubs (AROSC is a member) which is affiliated with SCCA and CSCC in sponsoring slaloms and solo 1 events.

There are four basic categories of cars: "Stock", prepared, prodified and modified. can we lose? Starting with the "Stock" category, only tools and jack may be removed from an automobile as delivered by a new car dealer. From there, each succeeding category allows more modifications too numerous to list here. Generally, the modifications will determine the class in

which you will compete. In order to give a little clearer understandind of classes, these are the categories and classes pertaining to Alfas:

Stock and Prepared categories Class I and Q- over 1800 Class K and T- Sedans, Spiders under 1800

Prodified category: Class A- GTZ Class D- Giulia Sprint GTA 1600 Duetto Spider 1600, 1750 Class E- Sprint and Spider 1300 1600 Veloce

Modified category: Class M- Modified production cars under 3000 cc Class Z- Modified production sedans under 2000 cc

This rallye is an annual rallye sponsored by the Covina Car Couples. It drew a team effort from the ALFA rallye enthusiasts that will not be forgotten soon by those involved.

We began with a full six car team out of the West Covina shopping mall at 8:00 pm on the eve of March 11. The first car out on our team was the Strona team in car #12. Beth and I were in #14, Dan and Kathy Fein were #16 with Dave and Connie Gamble driving a VEGA/ALFA in #17 with the other members of the AROSC team in a VETTE and another unmentionable non-Alfa make!

After completing the odo check out at the entrance to Chino we began to slip into the traps of the rallye. Beth mis-read the 39th instruction which would have given us a left at the first opp. after Stewart and we were promptlylost.

After a Swag at the end of a loss of nearly 15 minutes we were back on the rallye route, but, (Dave take note) the little red idiot light telling me my fuel pressure was low reared its nasty head. As long as I kept the revs up it went out and thus we scrambled for the next check point.

We ended the 1st half of the rallye at the Colony Kitchen in Yucca and breakfasted with the Stronas. We compared notes and I informed Phil of my fuel delivery problem. He was sympathetic but had no solution for me! After gulping down our late served repast we finally got the ALFA started and headed into the second half which was Monte Carlo style. We had spoken briefly with the rest of our team members at breakfast and therefore had no idea how they were fairing. (You really can't tell on TSD's)

Our 1st Monte checkpoint was out near Amboy. I was really having difficulty keeping the revs up and when one of the other rallyists began his weaving completely across the road I nearly creamed him while trying to heel and toe it! 
