"hey, it's just for fun, so get a cup of coffee and relax".

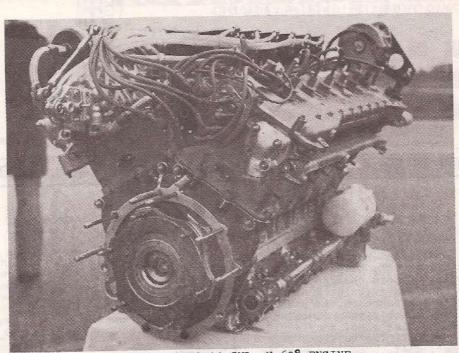

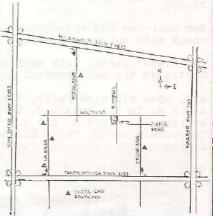

All in all it was a good day, even if I didn't get Paul Newman's autograph.

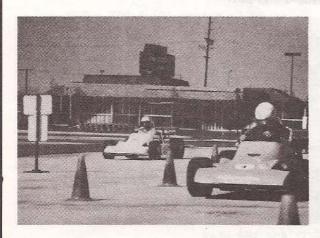
