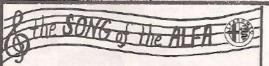

If you are interested in caravaning back for this event, please notify a board member and we'll link up those interested in making this trip.

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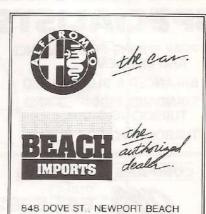
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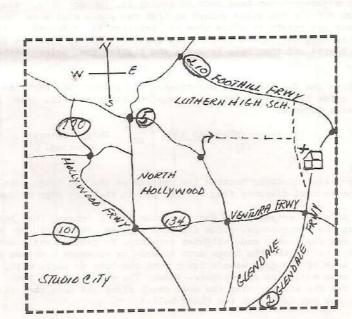

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TECH TALK

ALFETTA DOOR ADJUSTMENT

Look in the book (or at least in mine) under "door adjustment" and all you'll find mentioned is movement of the striker plate on the door frame. This is great if the problem is non-flush fit of the door at the rear edge, but doesn't really help if what needs adjusting is the door height as a result of sag on the hinges. Minor adjustments to the height of the closed door are possible by moving the striker plate upwards, but of course don't address the real problem - and make the door more difficult to close anyway.

Well, although not mentioned in the book, basic door height adjustment is performed by means of shims behind the hinges. Alfa does sell the shims (part # 11600 5573201/02 for the GT) but if your dealer doesn't have them or you feel like making your own, the sketch can be used as template. (Note that the shapes shown are for the GT - I suspect the sedan may be different.)

The basic procedure goes as follows:

- 1. Start by centering the striker plate, in case a previous attempt at height adjustment has been made by moving it. To do this, simply slacken off the two bolts enough so that the plate will move under pressure but remain in place when the pressure is released. Then, while holding the handle in the open position, gently push the door fully closed and then open it again and tighten the bolts without moving the plate.
- 2. Now close the door normally and measure the amount of sag. As a rough guide to the shim thickness required to correct it, use the following formula:

(X) times (MEASURED SAG) — Shim thickness required.

Where:

X = vertical distance between the centers of the two hinge pins.
Y = horizontal distance from a hinge pin to the back edge of door.

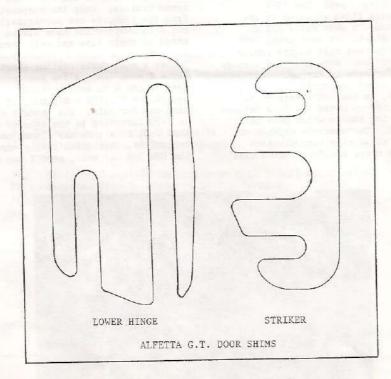
- 3. While a helper supports the door, slacken (don't remove) the bolts holding the lower hinge, slide the shim between the back of the hinge and the frame, and retighten securely. Be careful while doing this not to let the hinge move inwards or outwards unless the front edge of the door wasn't flush with the body to begin with, in which case adjust as appropriate. (Note: You will probably have to drive out the pin securing the door check strap and move the strap out of the way to get at the third bolt.)
- Repeat the sequence in step 1. to recenter the striker plate and you're done.
- 5. If you still have any patience left, the final touch for a perfect door adjustment is to center the engagement of the latch on the striker, using shims behind the striker plate (also shown in the

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sketch) - the procedure is to coat the pin with chalk or marker pen, close the door, note where the latch mark is, and then shim as neccessary so that the latch engages dead center on the pin.

Finally, a warning and a hint: First the warning - resist the temptation to use large washers as spacers instead of the correct shape shim. The door hinge and striker plate attachments are critical safety items and it is important that they be in contact with the frame over as large an area as possible. If that isn't enough, washers will cause you grief anyway since the holes in the frame are larger than the bolt diameter (to allow for adjustment), and the edges of the washers will tend to hang up and prevent perfect alignment of the door. The hint? Oh,yes - Once you're done, be sure and open a window before checking the smooth closing of your newly adjusted door - if you don't, air pressure build-up inside the car could fool you into thinking that the door is still difficult to close.

MY FAVORITE ALFA by R. S. Scholz



This is an easy one, no question about it. My favorite and most desirable Alfa is the Montreal, and I've not even seen it in real life...yet. The 1967 Bertone design first appeared at the Montreal expo - a show car - and an impressive start. It took until 1971 before the car was sold to the public and only 3925 cars were produced through 1977, all for sale in Europe. Everything about the Montreal, its "air" if you will, is that of a very exotic car. The 2593-cc ½ cam V-8 is a detuned type 33 racing engine which puts out over 210 HP. The power is capable of moving you along at a very pleasant 138 mph and there are four vented disc

brakes to bring you back to reality in short order. The dry sump lubrication takes 15 quarts of oil for those high speed cruises. Only the suspension, from the 1750, is not particularly exotic but Alfa suspensions have always been ahead of their time and well thought out at that.

I have a most basic feeling about this car - I want one. A few have made it over to the U.S. and, amazingly, can be bought for \$14,000 - \$15,000, if you can find one for sale. The thought of flying up I-70 listening to the exhaust note of that V-8, in a show car almost nobody recognizes, that costs little more than the BMW 320 ... well, need I say more?



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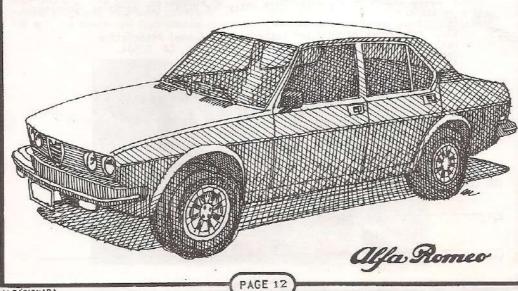
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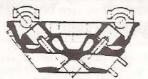
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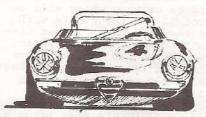

There is a new Owners Workshop Manual for 73 to 80 Alfetta Sedans and Coupes. This Manual 15 Haynes Publishing published by Group. This manual is a must for all Alfetta home mechanics. As backyard mechanic I don't know all the tricks to working on Alfas. So I was very impressed by this manual. It has a lot of little helpful clues as well as clear photos and diagrams. This manual impressed by this claims to be based on a complete teardown and rebuild of the car and I can believe it. I believe it is much clearer and easier to use than the Alfa Romeo shop manuals. This manual gives you useful info like the hidden screws how to find around the interior and how to remove the window cranks and door handles. In the engine section it shows which of the two grooves on the cam cap is the alignment mark, the other is an oil channel. There is also a picture of the timing chain connecting link, if you have never seen one it is very helpful. The diagram which shows the The diagram which shows the direction of the distributor rotor can help prevent getting the distributor in backwards like I did the first time. Throughout the manual hints are provided on using standard tools for jobs if possible which helps cut down on expensive Alfa tool purchases. In conclusion I think this manual is useful for Alfa tool purchases. any Alfetta owner. This manual should be available in autopart any Alfetta owner. This manual stores that carry other Haynes manuals, however since this one is new it might be a while before it is generally available.
