

If a dealer installed part fails it will be replaced without a second labor charge. A 6/6,000 warranty applies to parts from an Alfa dealer that a member installs.




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


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


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
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T.J. TECHNOID Verdi versus Wagner.

Ann Arbor—Cars are expressions of the cultures of the people who design and build them. Porsche and Alfa Romeo are interesting examples of this.

I had just tested a 944S and then drove the new Milano Verde 3.0. The 944S is one of my favorite cars; I was startled to find I felt the same way about the Alfa, with some qualifications.

My reasons for loving the behavior of the Alfa are largely emotional and irrational, but then so is the car. The various elements of the design range from brilliant to laughably inept. The Italians seem to direct great fervor and creativity toward the particular aspects of the car that moti-

vate them, but ignore the areas that fail to fascinate them.

I remember driving an Alfa Romeo GTV6 a year ago. I was on one of my favorite roads, enjoying the supple eagerness of the handling. The engine was making marvelous noises. I had to switch on the blower to demist the windshield, and when I did, the two round directional vent outlets popped right up out of the dash panel. Suspended

on their invisible shafts of blowing air, they danced like sugarplums before my transfixed eyes. I have been in love with the car ever since.

By contrast, the Porsche—any Porsche—reflects Teutonic thoroughness. The car is viewed as a total system, with each functional area receiving similar exacting attention to detail. I think it is fair to say the 944S is not a particularly emotional car to drive, but it is certainly a standard of excellence in vehicle behavior.

The Germans and their rigorously ordered thinking are able to achieve this excellence from less than ideal componentry. If you were sitting down with a clean piece of paper to design the ultimate chassis, you certainly would not choose MacPherson struts for the front or semi-trailing arms for the rear. Strut-type suspension can package very well, particularly in transverse engined front-wheel-drive vehicles, but it cannot deliver ideal roll-center or wheel-geometry behavior. To make it work at all, you need much stiffer springing and damping than with properly done unequal-length upper and lower control arms.

The semi-trailing-arm rear suspension is even more of a compromise. Let me quote a recent paper from the Proceedings of the Institution of Mechanical Engineers, titled The Jaguar XJ40 Project: "This [semi-trailing arm] arrangement is generally attractive for packaging reasons, but it has a number of fundamental deficiencies. Firstly, it has large changes in camber and steer angle with wheel travel, and secondly, if the wishbone bushes are made soft enough to obtain good ride characteristics, then significant throttle steer will be perceived."

It happens that my favorite Porsche is the 911. This is a car of great character, and as such, it is thoroughly disliked by some people. If treated with respect, I find it marvelous fun to drive, yet I am baffled why its makers chose such nasty pieces as struts and semi-trailing arms. Perhaps to the Porsche people, the challenge is to make the difficult behave. Certainly nobody does it better.

Now about that three-liter Alfa Milano. The car has a very strange appearance. In fact, I find it ugly. I imagine half a dozen Italian stylists clustered around the clay as the form takes shape, each person absorbed in his little bit of the surface, no one talking to—or particularly fond of—his neighbors. An Alfa really should not look like this. These cars were bred by Ferrari; Nuvolari cut his teeth on them and ultimately established his genius driving them. How can a company responsible for the Alfetta that Fangio drove permit something so visually strange to happen?

But regardless of how the Milano looks, I love the way it feels and drives. I frankly prefer its combination of ride and handling to that of the Porsche 944S. I prefer the 60-degree V-6 to the Porsche four, never mind the number of valves each has.

I admit that these preferences over my "standard" surprised me. Alfa's unequallength wishbone front suspension and de



Three-liter Alfa Romeo Milano: at once brilliant and inept, but outrageously fun.


Dion rear arrangement have been around for a dog's age and are sometimes referred to as archaic. I disagree. When you do something right initially, there is every reason to stick with it. It may not be a modern setup, but the geometry is beautiful, and the feel of the car reflects that innate correctness.

You may think it's silly to compare a four-door sedan to a Porsche 944S. I suggest you go for a drive in this Alfa and make your own judgments. At this price (\$19,800), the car is in a class by itself; and among four-door sports sedang, regardless of cost, the Milano's handling and performance are superb.

Maybe simply listening to engine noises really tells you everything you need to know. The Roman spirit loves soaring, romantic music, and Alfas (and Ferraris, and Lamborghinis) sing lusty arias that can break your heart. It sounds as if Verdi composed the Milano V-6 engine's note.

On the other hand, the Porsche fours (and the flat-six, and the V-8) make sharp, serious martial sounds. There's a definite Wagnerian tone, all brutal effectiveness, when you put your foot into it. This military beat can be stirring, too, don't misunderstand; look what *The Valkyrie* did for *Apocalypse Now.* But it doesn't pluck your heartstrings the way a passionate duet from *Aïda* does.
