



Pressure Brake Bleeding At Home

was never fond of the method of brake bleeding that calls for an "assistant." The assistant in question having other priorities than car mechanics.

At first, I sought to replace her with a piece of I x 2 wedged between the front seat and the brake pedal, and indeed this worked for a time on my 1600 GTV. But when I tried it on the Milano it was only a half-hearted success, resulting in a pedal that went partway to the floor before applying the brake.

So we decided to try power bleeding. The method outlined herein is easy, fast, requires no assistant other than a spare tire and doesn't use much brake fluid.

WASHER & TAPE

RESERVOIR

Three to four pint cans of Castrol should do

The accompanying drawing shows a modified Milano reservoir cap, but the same system should apply to other Alfas with screw-on caps. Some

points on the illustration:

■ The 5/16 bolt is drilled all the way through. The outside end may need to be countersunk with a larger hole in

order to clear the pin from the inflator hose. (This is the one that depresses the tire valve.)
The inflator hose in question is available at the kind of auto parts stores that sell a lot of stopleak, muffler bandages and motor additives.

The notched washer is to enable you to return to the use of the Milano's labyrinthine vent system after sealing it off for bleeding.

■ The tire cap keeps everything neat.

Procedure

If you're bleeding the brakes, it's probably because you're doing other brake work, so if you haven't already done it, now is a good time to clean out the reservoir. If you're not cleaning it out, at least siphon out the old fluid and replace with clean fluid before bleeding.

With the reservoir filled with clean fluid, and the inflator hose connected between it and the spare tire, you are ready to begin. Under the rear of the car, Attach a clear neoprene hose to the bleeder screw farthest from the reservoir. On Milanos and Alfettas, this is the passenger's side outboard screw. On older live-axle cars, it's the driver's side rear brake. The bleeder hose extends to an empty Moretti or Raffo beer bottle. It won't be necessary to put any brake fluid in the bottle to start with, as plenty will soon be coming down the tube.

As soon as the bleeder screw is opened, dirty fluid mixed with big air bubbles will come out, followed by clean fluid and what appear to be thousands of very small bubbles. It's

been my experience that you can put ten cans of fluid through your system and you're always going to get

these very small bubbles Therefore at this point. close the screw and ASHER W/HOTCH replace the dust cap. Be careful not to overtighten! When you're bleeding, make sure you hold the bleeder screw

against the threads to keep air from leaking into the system.

Now is a good time to refill the reservoir if you havent already done so. Don't allow it to become empty, as this will admit air into the lines and we'll have to begin again.

ELECTRICAL

GASKET

Work your way across the rear brakes from right to left, then bleed the passenger's front brake followed finally by the driver's side front brake.


Your efforts should be rewarded by a pedal without any sponginess whatever. If it seems to go halfway to the floor, then repeat bleeding.






