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
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


committments might have left us without any coverage if Shinji had not stepped forward to help fill the gap.







RSVP by Sunday July 19. (Yes - you Miss Manners dropouts can come if you forget to call.) I gotta' know how much stuff to buy.


#### Wine Tour '98

# **Beat The Boil**

Improving or restoring engine cooling of your Alfa or other vehicle

With summer starting, but with the antifreeze stains still on your paint, this may be a good time as any for a shot at engine cooling. We assume the thermostat operates and the system is clean. As always, the fixes suggested are long on labor and short on capital - not for recent lottery winners. They are most effective if the car boils at idle, when slowed in traffic, or under higher loads at relatively low speeds. If your *Alfa* cooks at 60 m.p.h. on the flat, go for the lottery ticket.

#### PRESSURE CAP

The obvious one. Be sure it seals and has the highest rated pressure that will seal on your radiator. Cooling capacity increases about 3% per 1 psi, so if your eleven psi cap leaks you are wasting about a third of your system potential.

#### RECIRCULATION

Cooling depends upon how much heat is adsorbed by the air passing through the radiator core. If hot air from the engine side blows around to re-enter the front, capacity, especially at low speeds is much reduced. To prevent this, the engine compartment needs to be sealed off from the front of the car.

Seals in older cars, marginal to start with, have usually deteriorated or been thrown away by impatient mechanics. A common casualty is the seal between the top of the radiator and the hood. The fix is to close the openings at the top, bottom, and sides of the radiator. Foam rubber or plastic works well. Caution! Forget this step if you have a demand (electric) fan or none at all. When no air moves through the core, under-hood temperatures can go through the roof. Mine did!

#### SHROUDING

Something for nothing - no strings!. A good shroud will do the following:

- 1. Drop radiator top temperature often 10 F to 20 F
- 2. Reduce fan horsepower required by 20%
- 3. Eliminate recirculation through the core and reduce it around the core.
- 4. Cut fan noise
- 5. Help keep tools including fingers out of harm's way.

If you have a shroud, it can be improved by sealing all holes and adding a flange encircling the fan. From the front of the fan this flange should extend 1/2 the fan blade width towards the engine, leaving the remaining half of the blade open to the engine compartment.

Production tolerances require that most cars have a lot more clearance between the blade tip and the flange than is desired for good air flow. This can be remedied by gluing a thin strip of sponge rubber to the inside to the flange. It should be thick enough to just clear or slightly interfere with the blade tips. Then crank (do not start) the engine and let the blades cut their own path for essentially zero clearance. Sounds fiddly, but I've seen it increase the flow and cooling 10% over that of the usual production shroud.

You can build your own shroud in this same configuration. A box or any other shape is fine as long as it clears the core by an inch and has the shroud to fan detail. If you can't use a shroud the fan should be a close to the radiator as running clearances will permit. This applies to electric fans on either side of the radiator as well.

Men of action are instinctively drawn to more dramatic solutions in the aftermarket. These include adding bigger, funnier looking and more bladed fans and turning them faster; almost always a waste of time.

#### FOR THE CHEAP AND DARING

This works on special occasions boilers; your Winnie for the annual tow of your race car, yacht and Cadillac Eldo over Tioga Pass. It is as simple as spraying water on the face of the radiator and works because, as millions of Espresso drinkers know, it takes 540 times as much heat to flash water to steam as it does to raise its temperature one degree.

It worked for me several times on a box stock (no cooling option) 3/4 ton Ford hauling a trailer over 100 F Tehachapi mountains out of Bakersfield. I ran a 1/4" hose from the trailer pressurized water system through a control valve in the truck cab to a water distribution tube across the top of the radiator. It didn't take much, less than the output of one windshield washer nozzle but it should be spread rather evenly across the upper core.

A motor home installation should be a cinch. Just hit the valve when the temperature gage heads towards the red. A modified windshield washer system should work well on anything without a water supply. Or you can put your first born on the bumper with his Blaster . . . .
