One additional note as we roll into summer: NOW is the time to start thinking about the direction you'd like AROSC to take next year, because NOW is the time to consider running for the 1999 board.



# Wild Flowers - 1999 Style

AROSC hits the backroads on its annual "In Search of Wildflowers" tour

Was there a tour to find the wild flowers this year? Of course there was. Were there any flowers to be found at the end of our tour? Of course there weren't. That is precisely why this early springtime tour has been dubbed "In Search of Wild Flowers".

That there weren't any flowers was the worst of the news, though. Unlike last year's Ididarod version (COLD and windy) this year's weather was quite co-operative. It was sunny, warm, and breezy. I put in a good word early, trying to make up for last year's near freeze-out. It must have worked, because from the fifteen cars on the tour, I heard not one complaint about the weather.



So if there were no flowers, and the weather was dry and windy, just what did we do? We toured, as the name of the event suggests. I led our merry band of *Alfa Romeos* (and others) through yet another set of mountain roads, from the north end of the San Fernando Valley to the outskirts of Lancaster, where the poppies, lupines, and such are reputed to bloom. As in the past, there were absolutely no freeway miles on this year's tour. This seemed to suit most of the adventurers fairly well. 

AROSC Time Trial is set for July 3rd & 4th

On the weekend of July 3rd and 4th, AROSC will hold its third Time Trial of the year at Buttonwillow Raceway, just north of Bakersfield. Even if you do not plan to enter yourself, come join us for the weekend and see for yourself why the AROSC Time Trial program is so highly regarded.

For the most part, minimum entry requirements for drivers are very simple. They consist essentially of the use of an approved helmet, eye protection, and non-synthetic clothing - although the use of a driving suit is encouraged.



Basic vehicle requirements consist of the ability to pass an inspection, use of upgraded safety belts, and the installation of an approved roll-over bar in open cars.

# Rich's Wheel Restoration


One enthusiast's approach to fitting his Alfa with wheels that are no longer sold.

One of the neat features of the '66 Sprint GTV I bought in June was the unusual wheels. They were 6.00 x 14 inch alloys made by Momo. From the Alfa Digest I learned they were "Vega's" and sold in the early '70s. Sales of these wheels was apparently quite widespread, as I even found photos of the wheels on Alfas in the British book "Alfa Romeo Spider" by D. Sparrow and A. Kessel, Osprey Classic Marques, 1995 (p. 22 and 59).

The wheels as they came on the car were fairly badly corroded (see Fig. 1), as apparently much of the wheel was not originally painted or clear coated and they sat unprotected for at least 14 years.




To remove this corrosion I had the wheels plastic-bead blasted by Gateway Co. (located near Lambert Field). Old timers in the club may remember visiting Gateway Co. in '92 for a description of the bead blasting process and a tour of their facilities. I was charged \$65 for blasting four wheels and got the wheels back in two days. They did an excellent job and I highly recommend them.

Next, I painted the wheels with PPG DP50 gray epoxy primer to try to prevent future corrosion. I gave each wheel 2 coats (this used about 1/3 quart primer and catalyst).

I decided to paint the wheels as they originally appeared (twotone) using Eastwood's Silver paint (#1291Z) for the rims and hole borders, and Eastwood's Charcoal (#1287Z) paint for the background.

After the initial silver coat, I had the tires mounted on the wheels. This was in case the mounting messed up the paint — the silver could be replaced relatively easily, compared to the two-tone paint job I had planned for the wheels. The completely silver wheel is shown in Fig. 2 with the tire installed.



In applying the darker coat, I had to mask off the silver part. I did this with paper masks and masking tape. I learned the hard way that I had to be very careful not to leave the masking tape on too long or it marred the paint it was supposed to protect! (If you're going to do something like this, be sure you use masking tape from an auto paint store.) To help protect the painted wheel, I applied Eastwood's Wheel Clear (#1331Z) as a topcoat.

A close up of the finished two-tone wheel is shown in Fig. 3. Also included at the top of this article is a shot of the finished wheels on my *Duetto*.

#### Center Cap Construction


The wheels originally came with plastic center caps containing the symbol:

MO

These too were well weathered and not really what I wanted. I sent Momo Inc. an e-mail message asking if they still had caps available for the Vega wheels (54mm) and they indicated that they did not. So I decided to try to make my own.

I had a good center cap from a "Turbina" alloy wheel that features a stylized Alfa badge that I used as a model. I scanned it into the computer, cleaned it up, "mirrored" it left-to-right, and printed it out on the laser printer on acetate at the correct size. I then painted it on the printed side with silver paint. But I still needed something to mount the acetate on.

So I made two disks from 1/8 inch plexiglass sheet (see Fig. 4). The disks were glued to each other with pvc pipe glue. To line up the disks, a 1/16 in hole was drilled at the center of each disk. The acetate emblem was then attached to the disks with double-sided tape. The result is shown in Fig. 5. Looks pretty good, but may be a bit too shiny when viewed from some angles.



# Mille Mig

AROSC brings you an exclusive report fro

Those of you sensitive to such things may have noticed I wasn't around much between late April and mid-May. That's because Bonnie and I took off to Italy for some touring and to join up with a group organized by *AROSC's* very own David Gooley to hit some of Italy's automotive high points. And for me, the highest of the high was the *Mille Miglia*.

This year's *Mille Miglia* was so exciting that any report I file here would hardly do it justice, so I'll just give you an inkling of what it was like.

Setting out from LAX about 10 days before the race, we couldn't help notice two of the racecars were being loaded into our *Alitalia MD-11* jet's aft cargo section. Neither was an *Alfa* but, from my somewhat distant vantage point in the terminal departure lounge, one appeared to be a Ferrari and the other could have been a Maserati. Anyway, it was classier luggage than *we* were bringing along.




For years I've seen photos and videotape of the "recreated" 1000 mile Brescia-Roma-Brescia race held early every May, and in most of them I've noticed people bundled up in coats and hats, gloves and slickers, and everything wet and glistening with rain. This year, though there were dark clouds, it was seasonably warm and there was no rain for the start in Brescia. The sun even put in occasional appearances en route. I'm sure this was especially appreciated by people in open cars, and most especially by those in the very early, very rare cars from the primordial decades of our waning century.

Of course, no car in the *Mille Miglia* is newer than vintage 1957, and with that in mind it is truly amazing that this year there were over 370 participants, with the oldest being, I believe, from 1903! Cars generally considered rare (and some in fact were certifiably unique) were there in their numbers, including a flock of top-pedigree *Alfa* champs from the 20s and 30s, a herd of Mercedes Gullwings, legions of pre-war BMWs, a bevy of beau-

erable cars negotiating the narrow twisties of a medieval town that teeters on the edge of an escarpment and that is topped with not one but two ancient castles! All of the country's political dignitaries turned up on a reviewing stand set on a restaurant terrace, as the cars passed in parade.

We last enjoyed the cars passing from the vantage point of a café table in Florence's *Piazza della Signoria* with the Ufizi Gallery, the *Palazzo Vechio*, and the statue of David forming an exquisite backdrop. Even the sun came out to cheer them on!

The modern Mille Miglia is not truly a race but rather a Time-Speed-Distance rally, which is taken to a greater or lesser degree of seriousness by the participants, on a scale ranging from lunatic to complete dis-

regard, and this is part of the event's great charm, of course. More than one car pulled up at our rather crowded café while the pilot and navigator got out and were handed cappuccinos by waiters, fans, and accomplices, the participants plainly having a great time socializing and in no hurry to reach the next check point.



Like us, I guess they felt that just being there was enough!

In your wildest dreams, can you imagine scenes like these on our highways and in our city streets?






