

Cost: Sellers' cost is \$10 for members, \$20 for nonmembers for an average space. Sellers who require a larger area will be charged an additional fee.

Directions: Autostrada is located between Bolsa Chica and Springdale, just south of McFadden. This is about ½ mile south of the Boeing Huntington Beach facility. The shop is in a building that spans east to west between Graham and Industry, and is the second building south of McFadden. Access to the front of the building is from the 3rd driveway off Industry. Buyers may park anywhere on Industry. Fred will direct sellers to a space in the driveway & parking area in front of his shop building.


From the east or west, exit the I-405 at Springdale/West-minster and proceed south on Springdale about 1.5 miles to McFadden (at a light). Turn right and proceed about ½ mile, past Graham (a stop sign), to Industry and turn left.

From the northeast, exit the 22 Fwy at Valley View/Bolsa Chica, turn left, and proceed south about 2.5 miles to McFadden (at a light). Turn left and go about ½ miles east, then turn right on Industry, just before the stop sign at Graham.




Doug's Saga: The End

[The story so far, as printed in the August Alfacionada: Doug got a late start on his drive to Portland, due to working out of town and needing an oil change and some needed tinkering, including a hole in his muffler. He started out late on Tuesday and got as far as Sacramento, with a leaking muffler again. Wednesday morning, he decided to go over to the coast and drive Highway 1 north from San Francisco to Crescent City, where he found a fuel leak at the filter near the injection pump, and a drivetrain vibration, probably a bad U-joint. Thursday, he arrived in Portland just in time for tech inspection for the Time Trial, with his leaks and vibrations continuing. Friday was the Time Trial, and he ran 2 of the 3 practices, spending the middle session fixing his fuel leak. He was concerned in the last practice because other people in his class were blowing by him, several seconds a lap faster. Of course, they had more practice, and also might have run at Portland Int'l Raceway before. He continues with his Time Trial experiences...]

My driving was very rough, I was way off the apexes, and the car was not set up right. During lunch I thought to myself, I really don't want to be disgraced here. Then I thought about the professional race drivers who set their cars up and learn the track with similar practice time to what I had...what a great opportunity, to emulate my heroes!

I decided to concentrate on two things: set the car up as well as I can, and think through the track to improve my driving. I adjusted air in the tires and removed some negative camber from the front tires. Then I looked at a track map and decided I just had to get closer to the apexes here, carry a little more speed there, etc. By the time they called my group I was first in line and got gridded up behind a red Alfetta. I felt a lot faster right away but of course had no time to explore the limits with the new setup. After two laps I was right on the Alfetta's tail and figured I'd pass him next lap...but that was the last timed lap (which was a surprise, I thought there

would be two more). My time was four seconds better than in practice and I ended up only a little behind the leaders of my group. If I had done the second practice I might have had a shot for second. It shows what a little thinking can do.

The organizers put on an autocross in parallel with the time trial. I signed up for that at as well, and as soon as I completed my timed laps I drove over to the slalom course. In my car it was all second gear work, and was an interesting course with one fairly fast section. It would be fun if someone from AROSC would set up an autocross in conjunction with our time trials.

Other than the compressed practice schedule, the Oregon club did an excellent job organizing this time trie... They had lap times posted immediately after each practice. There were a large number of Marshals running the event, all doing very professional jobs. There were, of course, more Alfas than I have ever seen at a time trial, including some quite interesting ones such at TZs, and a few "foreign" cars (non-Alfas). The track was nice, with big runoff areas, but a little hard to figure out.

People who went to the Seattle track day on Wednesday said that track was much better, like Germany's Nurburgring. Another thing about this time trial was the number of spectators. Many of the non-time-trialers at the Convention came out to watch, along with family members, and we had a large built-in audience of Alfa

fans. So of course lots of people came by to chat and look at the cars while I was sorting out fuel leaks, leaky mufflers, camber adjustment, etc. It was a tiny taste of what the pros deal with. No one asked for my autograph.

After the time trial we went back to the hotel for a car wash session (I skipped the car wash for another attempt at muffler sealing), a look at the vendor displays, and later the banquet. I'm not sure where they came from, but some magnificent pre-war Alfas (one raced by Nuvolari) materialized at the time trial and later in the banquet room. The banquet capped off a big day and was a chance to meet some of the long-time Club leaders whose names show up in Alfa Owner.


Saturday's offerings included various tours and rallies. I skipped these in favor of looking some more at the vendor displays and going to some of the lecture/discussion sessions, specifically Wes Ingram and Pat Braden. After that I packed up for the long boring drive home along Interstate 5.

I made two brief stops on the way home. The first was at a berry farm where I bought 6 different kinds of berries, several of which I had never heard of, for \$8.00 (have you ever heard of "monster berries"...something like a blackberry but the size of an apricot). Then a little farther on I saw a sign for the Oregon Steam Museum and pulled

off again. This turned out to be a farm equipment museum with many old steam and gasoline tractors. I wandered around for a while and noticed there was a lot of activity. I wondered to myself, where do they get all these volunteers, and on the way out noticed the sign that said their big annual event was a week later...so I got the big show for free.

Around midnight, at the California State line, my options were to drive all night without stopping, or stop for the night and drive the California Central Valley in the afternoon heat. I pressed on, and got home at 9:00 Sunday morning. Monday I went to work and took a night flight back to New Mexico.

So, was it worth close to a week of hard traveling for one day of time trialing? Let me put it this way. It was great to do a time trial with the National Club, see lots of unusual Alfas, hear some well-known figures talk, and meet some old friends. The Oregon club put on a great event, well organized with lots of activities, and there was a high level of excitement. I'm disappointed I didn't go to the Seattle track day, and that the car didn't behave better. As it was, I'm glad I went, but I wish I'd had more time. Everyone who likes Alfas should go to at least one National Convention, you'll have lots of great memories, but my advice is make sure you have enough time to savor the moment.




AROC Consour


Another P3 in the pits at PIR -- in racing trim





The rear view of the 1938 8C-2900B Berlinetta by Touring


This 1932 P3 (Tipo B), fitted with fenders for road use, was found in the Fime Trial pits, and at the Concourse. The history of this particular car was not noted by the editor, but was purported to have been driven in some significant event (Mille Miglia? Targa Florio?) by a significant driver, as best as I can remember.

These details show why this model was thought by many to be one of the most beautiful Grand Prix racers ever built. It was driven by Nuvolari to resounding victory over cars of the Third Reich at the German Grand Prix in 1935.

David Wall Carries Flag for So-Cal Alfisti!

Vintage Racing in the Pacific North West

Along with Kevin McKee from the bay area, AROSC member David Wall of San Diego took part in the two Northwest vintage races this summer: July 1-3 in Seattle and July 7-9 in Portland.

Getting David's cars accepted was the first hurdle (especially with the SOVERN group in Seattle). With the

popularity of vintage racing at an all-time high, the organizers can pick and choose amongst applicants to fill their girds.

Alfa was the featured marque and this along with some persistent phone calls and changes to the cars got both the GTV and 1957 Spider finally accepted. This is frustrating since none of the many racing organizations on the West Coast can agree on a single set of guidelines or rules. SOVERN talks tough but I saw many things contrary to what they were preaching on their own cars.

We skipped the VARA Temecula race to concentrate on the road trip and this combined with superb preparations by David's mechanic Scott Huebner saw both cars run well both weekends. That always makes thing easier when you can concentrate on going faster instead of just going!

The racing was great in Seattle, and despite odd placements of both cars David ran second in class pretty much the whole weekend. We even managed to avoid the wet sessions that plagued some of the other classes! The hospitality was great and there were many neat cars to see on (and off) the track, including 2 TZs and a TZ2.

To my mind Portland was the better of the two weekends. Because the Champ cars run there the track is excellent and very smooth. For all the posturing, SOVERN does, I felt Portland, in a low-key manner, actually did a better job of grouping the cars. This meant that David ran against a 250 Testa Rossa Ferrari and Type 59 Bugatti in his Pre-'59 Group 1 race which was very

entertaining. Running his correctly engined 1957 Spider, he handily beat the other 5 Alfas all weekend only to be nipped at the finish on Sunday by one of the Giulietta Sprints. It turns out this car had one of the rare 1600 motors that were available in 1959 – HA! HA!

After pressing Kevin for the lead in the GTV group all



weekend, David took a fine first victory on Sunday when Kevin had a rare DNF. Local Favorite Dennis Pillar was right behind in his 1750-powered Giulia Spider but consistent fast laps kept David in front of a field that also included AROSC's Peter Nitoglia and 5 other Alfas. Someone counted 22 Alfas racing in Portland and I saw many fine cars we don't see locally, including two standout lightweight Giulietta Sprints.

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

Convention Committee Volunteers Needed! This Means You!

<u>Convention Chair</u> – Coordinates all tasks, within convention committee and with AROC. Plans and coordinates schedule of all events.

<u>Finance Committee --</u> Prepares budget, pays bills, deposits income, and oversees costs. Also solicits sponsors & advertisers, gets ads for program book, & collects door prizes.

<u>Registration Committee</u> -- Collects registration forms & income, prepares & prints program book, prepares reg. packets including tickets for events, hand-outs, and freebies, and distributes packets on-site.

PR/Publicity Committee -- Prepares articles for Alfa Owner, Alfacionada, and other AROC chapter newsletters, plus local newspapers and automotive magazines, for pre- and post-event publicity. Arranges for photos during all events. Develops convention theme and logo, orders promo handouts.

Hotel Coordination Committee Selects hotel, with agreement of Convention Committee, and provides single contact for all arrangements with hotel: meeting rooms, meals, meetings, parking, car wash, etc., with help/approval from Convention Chair & Financial Chair.

Meal Chairs – plan all arrangements for hotelbased meals: room, speaker, A/V, menu, & bar/reception

Meeting room chair – plans all meetings and arranges for meeting rooms: board of directors, tech sessions, chapter enhancement meetings, etc.

<u>Competition Events Committee</u> – Coordinates competition events, locations, rules, tech inspections, timing, car numbers, trophies, etc., as required for each type of event:

Time Trial Chair Autocross Chair TSD Rally Chair Gimmick Rally Chair Concours Chair

<u>Tours Committee</u> – Arranges for tour sites, plans and coordinates tours, schedules, routes, busses, meals if required, costs, head-counts, provides tour escorts, etc.

Tour 1 Chair – Movie studios: Sony, Universal? Tour 2 Chair – Auto collections: Petersen,

Nethercutt, Bothwell, or Marconi...

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
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


