


Wine Tour <u>Announcement</u>





HOW TO GET THERE:

- 1. From the north or west, proceed east of the I-405/ I-605 interchange for about 2 miles; get into the far right lane looking for the 22 FWY exit from the 405, and exit onto Bolsa Chica Road from that interchange. Follow Bolsa Chica Road south about 4 miles to Warner Avenue and turn right. Stay in the right lane, and turn right at the next light, Algonquin. Take the first left, onto Davenport, and again take the first left at Courtney, but make it a double left onto the access street next to Davenport. This leads you onto Malta Circle to the right. 17041 is the one-story white house with blue trim.
- 2. From the east or northeast, take the 22 FWY west to Valley View, just before the 22 joins the 405. Turn left at the signal onto Bolsa Chica, and follow the directions above. Valley View and Bolsa Chica are the same street, but the name changes at the 22 FWY.
- 3. From the south or southeast, take the I-405 north to Warner Avenue exit, and proceed west on Warner about 4.5 miles to Algonquin, and follow the directions above. OR, take Pacific Coast Highway through Huntington Beach to Warner Avenue, and proceed about a mile to the first traffic light, at Algonquin. Turn left and follow the directions above.

Julian Tour Report

The weather is looking very uncooperative on this Saturday morning in May. I have driven though cold fog, drizzle, and how dark clouds to park on the side of a lonely stretch of highway 243 in southern Riverside County. To the North I can make out the edge of the little town of Banning, one of many non-descript places along I-10 east of Riverside. To the South the highway winds up into the San Jacinto Mountains, or so I am told; the mist hides the view. Not inspiring.


Hook at the clock on the dashboard again. It reads 8:45. I see a car coming from the direction of Banning. I watch in anticipation. As it gets closer I see that it is just an old Toyota. I watch as it puffs up the hill into the clouds. A few minutes later a catch a glimpse of red. As it approaches I start to make out the distinctive graceful lines of a Phinfarina design. Finally I make out the occupants; it is Kevin and Dawn in their Alfa Romeo Spider. I really am in the right place! With Kevin here I know that the run up the hill will start soon.

Soon a GTV6 (Hap & Kristen Hansen), a GTV (Fred & Tina Firschein), and a Giulia Spider (Jon & Zona McKibben) join us. Introductions are followed by the distribution of maps by Kevin, our tour director, and a brief description of the drive. By 9:30 we are on our way. We fire up the engines, a V8, a V6 and 3 DOHC 4's, and with Kevin in the lead we are off. The early morning air vibrates with the sound of Italian engines revving up the road and down shifting into the turns. Soon the meeting point is quiet once again.



Rounding the first switchback, we blaze into a glory of blue sky and sunshine! The road looks seductive. The tight

curves are connected by short straights. We continue up the hill sweeping through the turns and accelerating up the straights, climbing above the dreary weather. The scenery is breathtaking as we drive through the pines of the San Bernardino National Forest. First stop is Idyllwild.



23 miles later we are at Jo An's restaurant in Idyllwild, lounging at a table under the pines. Just a coffee stop, so we "order light": mostly just a cinnamon roll and a coffee.

The food arrives and we realize this "light meal" would feed us for the weekend. The cinnamon rolls were eight inches across and



two inches high, drenched in sugar and butter. It looked more like a cake than a roll. Through mouthfuls, we all protested our good intentions.




After extracting ourselves from the tables we headed out to the cars and were soon on the road again. Highway 243 winds down the mountain, one panoramic vista after another, and connects to highway 74, where we continued south through high green meadows and a roadway lined with wildflowers. At highway 371 we left the San Bernardino National Forest. 371 took us through the town of Anza and the Cahullia Indian Reservation to highway 79 at Aguanga. A short run down 79 and we were at our second stop at Sunshine Summit.

Here we were met by Alex who provided transportation (for the dirt-road challenged) to his Shadow Mountain Vineyard. We also picked up three more cars: Regan in his Montreal, Jay and Catherine's Duetto, and a Calloway GTV6 driven by Tom Gillis. At Shadow Mountain we had a tasting of their latest wines followed by a lunch of tri-tip and grilled salmon. The food was very tasty and went well




with the selection of wines. Naturally, it was further enhanced with much pleasant conversation of all things automotive. After a while we were given a tour of the vineyards by Alex where he described the selection of



vines and how they were selected for the microclimate of the area. At the conclusion of the tour we visited the aging

cellar and the fermentation tanks. A few purchases were made, and we were driven back to Sunshine Summit



where most of our cars were parked. There was a brief wait while the thirstier cars filled up and then it was "Tally Ho"!

We were running a little later than planned (vineyards are so darned relaxing!) so Kevin altered the route slightly so that we would arrive in Julian by 5 o'clock. The route to Julian took us past the Santa Ysabel Indian Reservation. After winding down from the oak-covered hills of Sunshine



Summit, it was mostly straight flat roads across high desert until we got near Julian. Just as the roads got nice and twisty again we caught up with an SUV. This driver seemed to think that the signs indicating the speed through the turns was for Ferraris (or Alfas!) and so he should cut that speed to one third so he wouldn't tip over. Probably wise, given SUV driver prowess. Of course he turned off just before we got into Julian. After finally getting some open road Kevin was having such a blast that he passed up the turn we were suppose to take and brought us in to Julian on the wrong side. What to do? Of course, we

time there was no SUV but there was a Taurus. He was a little faster but not much. Don't these people know that we had the roads reserved for our own use? The main reason we had to backtrack to come in to town the proper way was that was where the crowds were waiting to greet us. After parading down the main street of Julian, and letting all of the locals get a glimpse of the cars that they will find then they reach heaven, we pulled into the Julian Lodge.

After getting settled in our rooms we had time for a stroll around town before going to dinner at the finest (and only) to the restaurant in Julian. Kevin said that the meal was not up his expectations but I found my meal to be quite good. If course I'm use to dining at places that have drive-thrus at lam not really considered a gourmet. Unfortunately by the time dinner was finished it was too late to search out a precedent to see the famous Julian Apple Pie. Some of as solved this dilemma by making a beeline to such places the next morning; I was still recovering from the contament of the second of the famous places.

On a clear and sunny Sunday morning we awoke early to enjoy the very generous semi-continental breakfast in the lodge dinning room. By 9:30 we were all assembled except for Regan, who chose to sleep in without telling anyone, and the couple in the GTV6 who were heading home that morning. The higher consumption rate cars went to the gas station to refuel, and eventually all the 6 remaining cars were sorted out. About 10:00 we got on the road again, and though the worshipful crowds were gone we were escorted by a flock of Ducatis.

The winding road of yesterday was finally free of SUVs and such, so about 13 fast and twisty miles out of town at Scissors Crossing, we turned south onto S2. This passes through Earthquake Valley and follows the old Overland Stage Route. This stage was about 50 miles of two-lane blacktop with hardly a car in site. Long straights like most desert roads, but with sudden and very tight sections through every hill and canyon that stood in the way of the stage route surveyors. We were lucky to go through early in the year so that it was cool, only about 90 F. During the summer it gets down right warm our there! So we admired the many flowers of the high desert in bloom, stopped for a photo op, and headed south into "real" desert. We finally made it to Ocotillo where we gassed up again. But not for long; now it really was hot!

The plan was to hop on to I-8, go over the hill and get off at Carizzo Gorge Road and drop on down to highway 94. There was quite a bit of traffic on I-8 and because of the grade and the heat a lot of it was going slow. This was the


only time I have ever seen my oil temperature get above 80 C. Well, we all made it over the hill and finally got a chance to run up the RPMs and cool off the engines. Kevin and Dawn were having too much fun again, and they missed the off ramp. Well, to be fair, it was not marked by the name of the road we expected. Apparently the Duetto did get off there (or somewhere) because we never saw them again (though later they emailed that they ended up at an Italian Street Fair in San Diego, and had a fine time). Awhile further down the road Kevin realized his mistake and took a likely off ramp. Unfortunately this caught some of the cars on the wrong side of a semi so we ended up losing the GTV and the Giulia Spider. Oh well, the GTV was heading home anyway. With just three cars now we headed south down past Lake Morena, under the overhanging oaks and winding through gently rolling hills. At highway 94 in Cameron Corners, we slowed for the stop sign and Dawn spotted the Giulia Spider tearing down the other road. Still rolling up to the stop, Kevin honked at them and scared the bejeezes out of the Volvo driver in front of Kevin. Anyway, everyone pulled over and we were all able to link up again. You just can't plan this kind of fun!



Now back up to four cars, we once again headed west and turned south to Tecate, Mexico. Kevin talked to the operator of a customs house, who let us park the cars outside his office while we walked across the border for lunch. We ate lunch in an outdoor café in the town park, which I understand is something of an institution in Tecate. 
