

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AROC Convention 2002: Costa Mesa, CA

CONVENTION UPDATE

It is time to start thinking more about our upcoming convention, which is now less than 6 months away! We have been finalizing much of our planning, and have had to make some changes in our program, so here's the latest info.

The driving factor in these changes is the recent availability of the California Speedway, Fontana infield road course for our time trial and autocross. The Shelby American Club had booked the entire 4-day weekend last summer when the course was first announced. We have been in contact with them to see if we could get a day for our convention, and they finally decided that they could part with one day, Thursday July 4. We originally planned the time trial for Friday, with the beach party to follow, but such is life. It is not prudent to plan a beach party for July 4, as past history has shown too much drunken misbehavior at the beach on that day and night, and the police department has a zero tolerance policy which can be less than festive.

So our first event at the Fontana infield will be the Convention Time Trial and Autocross! For all you competitors out there, you need to be a member of the club: AROC/AROSC. You don't need to drive an Alfa to compete. Entries will be processed on the basis of first come, first entered, and since ours is a competitionoriented club, we expect to see a large contingent of local drivers out there. Understand that this will be a time trial only, no race group, as that is prohibited by the national competition code. The autocross will be held in the pit area, rather than outside in the parking lot. In addition, the track has agreed to provide us with a parade lap or two around the big 2-mile oval during the lunch break, so we can all get the feel of this great facility. We will also offer lunchtime laps around the time trial course for a modest fee, as VARA does.



Alfa Trivia - Spark Plugs

Spark plugs are made by various companies: each have their own ideas and 'gimmicks' (if that's the word for it) but here I intend only to generalize, except for Lodge plugs, as they are the ones specified by Alfa Romeo. That is not so say they are the only ones that can be used, though if a car using them is still covered by warranty it would pay to keep using them. I went away from them some years ago when the Alfetta started to use a bit of oil and they tended to oil up; also the price of them at that time was a deterrent. The plug I went to was an NGK BP7ES, a projected nose plug and it tended to keep itself clean. Probably a similar plug of any brand would have done the same job, but those are the ones I chose at the time. Since then I have used the NGK mostly, but still carry a set of Lodge 2HL for when I go out on the race track. If you ever consider using a projected nose plug be careful as the ground electrode will interfere with the valves on 2 liter engines, and maybe some others. The 1750 engine seems to be OK; maybe they have smaller valves.

The ability of a plug to keep itself clean is governed by its heat range. A plug as illustrated in Figure 2 is called a 'cold' plug as it has a shorter insulator. Any heat buildup at the nose can be dissipated quickly as it has a shorter distance to travel to the cooled metal of the cylinder head. The other illustration, Figure 1, shows a plug with a long insulator and this is called a 'hot' plug as the heat, having further to travel, will build up at the tip of the insulator. A cold plug for instance would be used in a racing engine where it is important to disperse the heat quickly. Should a hot plug be used under the same conditions the heat buildup would cause preignition and not only destroy the plug, but maybe destroy the engine as well. The correct plug for any engine should operate cool enough to prevent its own destruction and yet hot enough to keep itself clean.

In any engine the correct plug should show a gray-brown deposit on the insulator, and little wear on the electrodes. The spark gap would normally increase at about 0.001 inch (0.025 mm) per 1000 miles. At the same time it

should be noted that if the engine has been idling for some time, that same plug could appear dry and sooty. An overheating plug will show a glazed appearance on the electrodes, the insulator white or yellowish and with practically no other deposits. This can also be caused by a very lean fuel mixture, or even faulty ignition timing. Taking this even further, these faults could cause the electrodes of the plug to be destroyed, and there is also the danger to the engine. There is of course the opposite of this, where the plug is black and oily. This is usually caused by worn piston rings or valve guides. Generally speaking, spark plugs are made to operate in a heat range between 850 and 1650 degrees F; they should run hot enough to keep any carbon deposit burned off without causing any damage. This will prevent misfiring, as it is the buildup of carbon on a plug that will cause the hightension voltage to track along the carbon rather than jump the spark gap.

As a youth I used to wonder why a spark plug had a gap of about 0.025-inch (0.6-mm) and yet above the engine the high voltage would throw a spark nearly half an inch. Later I found out that the engine draws in a charge of gas, oil vapor, and air, which is compressed by the piston rising in the cylinder, and owing to the fact that oil vapor is an insulator, a spark can only jump a small distance through this compressed gas mixture. Reduce the compression and the spark will jump further, increase it and the gap will have to be closer. The spark gap on a plug is usually an optimum setting, which allows for cold starting as well as wear at the gap due to electrical erosion.


With Lodge plugs the situation is a bit different. On these the spark gap seems to be enormous but it is the result of research into the characteristics of the spark under engine conditions. Here, the spark leaves the center electrode and travels along the surface of the ceramic center and finally jumps the air gap. See Figure 3. Apparently, in order to help the spark travel in this manner a small condenser and an auxiliary air spark gap are built into each plug. The result is that only the center electrode is eroded away and this seems to be of little significance as it just increases the distance the spark has to creep along the ceramic by a few thousandths of an inch. So the main advantage of these plugs, according to the experts, is superior self-cleaning and an electrode gap that needs no regular adjustment; also, it is supposed to give a better





spark at starting when the voltage is low. In the drawing (Figure 3) which is taken from an Alfa Romeo information sheet, all parts can be readily identified, but although there is mention of an auxiliary air gap, I can't see just where it is. The shaded section to the left, leading to the electrode is filled with a brown substance, which appears to conduct electricity as well as the rest of the plug. I thought at first it may be a resistor but if it is, it must be of very low value, as I can't get a reading on it. The only suggestion I have is that the condenser has the auxiliary air gap incorporated with it.

When it comes to precious metal plugs, the only advantage they have is that they last longer. Now I know a lot of people use premium plugs for whatever reason, and I don't doubt they have their reasons, but whether I am biased or not I still think the plugs I use at present suit my car best, if not in performance, then in cost.

P.S. A couple of years after this was written, my plugs had to be changed from BP7ES to BP6ES as there was a change in fuel chemistry when lead was removed and replaced with aromatics. This caused the fuel to leave a sooty deposit when it burned, and so to keep plugs clean it was necessary to use a hotter plug.







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
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LATE NEWSLETTER? 1st Class mail offered




