

Mostly Ramblings of Il Presidente!









New Year's Day Car Gathering

Concours Primer

Getting Ready for Pepperdine on February 29

Many of my friends have been asking me to introduce myself, talk about Concoursing and give some tips on car preparation. The February issue of *Alfa Owner* has a sixpage spread on the subject from Arno Leskinen, National Concours Chair. The general tone and intent of Concoursing that Leskinen suggests is spot on, my goal is to have well prepared cars presented in wonderful settings, and seen by as many people as possible. Your car will become safer, faster, and more reliable. The better it looks and the more you participate, the better ambassadors of Alfa both you and your car become!

My name is Doug Adler and I am new on the Board of Directors for your AROSC. My family and I have participated with the club for the last couple of years, making a majority of the events: track, schools, wine tours, concours, parties, and the likes. You may know me by my cars, which are Lancia Scorpions / Montecarlos. I have just made a deal to bring home a Stepnose GTV, but more on that another time. So I am now an official Alfa Owner, and an enthusiastic convert.

I have experienced some mild success on the concours field and somehow got drafted into being your Concours Director. I will attempt to fill the void and will be relying on Charlie Schwartz's guidance while I learn the ropes, but in the meantime, I have devised some grand plans to start off our new season of judging. (See Celebration of California Style – page 11)

So what will the judges be looking for? What should we expect at the club concours level? How should you prepare your car? What if you want people to see your car but you don't care if it is judged? Well, Concoursing is an art and a game. The best part is that you can take it as far as you want depending on what class and whether you choose to compete for yourself or top honors. The best part is you and your car are always better off for participating.

For a list of classes and rules, check out the newly revised Competition Code of AROSC and find out the club's official criteria. We will always be running or judging a show in accordance with the guidelines, although I do reserve the right to expand or interpret those guidelines as situations arise. That being said, the basics are that there are thirteen suggested typical categories ranging from

Open to Race Prepared, and scoring is based on a 215-point scale. Trophies / Ribbons will be awarded when there are minimum of three cars in any one class, and a Best of Show and People's Choice award will be announced at each event. There is \$10 entry fee to have your car judged, proceeds of which go toward awards.

We want you to spend time with your Alfa and use the concours as a showcase for your hard work and as a deadline to provide the motivation to take care of the details and make your Alfa prettier, cleaner, more well preserved, and generally refreshed for more playtime! Go crazy with the cleaning, but realize that some techniques are more effective than others. Wax or polish is great, but swirl marks and white gunk in the cracks is criminal. Tire and wheel cleanliness is paramount, but slimy tire goop is gross.

So what should you do? Masking tape is your friend. Mask areas like canvas top edges to avoid white stuff. Mask under carriage and underhood sections for a bit of satin black rattle-can touch-up. Turn masking tape over on itself to remove lint and interior crack crud. Use disposable natural-fiber paint brushes to clean out air vents and controls, switchgear, seat crevices and the carpet corners while you vacuum. For exterior touchups, try a toothpick instead of a brush to flow thicker paint onto the stone chip. Fill the chip to the paint's original depth about three days before polishing everything together. Try using cling film to shield underhood electrical components when you clean the engine. Some people blast with high pressure and some use strong degreasers. Beware that these may remove paint and or the natural sheen (patina) of the painted surfaces.

I am not going to give away all the secrets, but here is a biggie: WD-40. Sshhh... Just between you and me. Our Italian gems sweat oil from every pore, and to keep everything really fresh I use WD-40. Lots of it. Agitate with a brush as you spray for max effect. WD-40 penetrates grease and oil and when subsequent engine heat is applied, viola the old greasy mess starts to clean itself. Furthermore, WD-40 is water displacing and will help weather fortify your car. Liberally baste for a sparkling engine. Wipe with rags often, and also just before a show.


Have a detail tip? Share it at the concours. See a car that is magnificently clean? Ask the owner how they did it and find out their secrets to success. Maybe your car is a great driver but not ready for showing. Come out to the concours to get ideas and meet others that can help you find that elusive trim piece or find out where to get your car repaired, painted, detailed, etc. The price is right and the people you will meet are fantastic.

Concours are great opportunities to prepare your car and share your beauty with friends. While this is a competition and the judges will look under your car, under the bonnet, in the boot and scour your interior, the effort is intended to reward those with the most care. While the older car will win in the event of a tie, the field is level when it comes to preparation. Have fun and rule of thumb is if you think it needs it, it really does need it.

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
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
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

The AROSC Competition Program once again provided a lot of excitement and fun throughout the past year. Our track program (driving schools, time trials, and races) continues as the best bargain in the Southern California club racing scene with a unique, safe but relaxed and friendly atmosphere. Our Concours program continues as low-key, fun events, ending with a big bash at Woodley Park. We had a more than full program last year, with three Concours, two Driving Schools, and an "extra" time trial (for a total of six) when we picked up Laguna Seca on short notice. We added some new events: a two-hour Enduro race at the Buttonwillow time trial, and a Rally directed by AROSC Vice President Bill Carson. We also ran a time trial at Las Vegas for the first time in many years. All these events were described in more detail in Alfacionada through the year, so no need to rehash them again here.

This year's program promises continued success, with a "normal" program of five time trials (Enduro again at Buttonwillos), two driving schools, and three Concours, with the first one to be on the lovely grounds of Pepperdine College. Bill is also planning to hold two rallies this year.

Alfa Time Trials and Racing

We had six time trials, at Willow Springs (twice), Laguna Seca, Buttonwillow, Fontana, and Las Vegas. In time trials, we use a point system similar to Formula One racing, awarding 9 points for first in Class, and 6, 4, 3, 2, and 1 for second through sixth places, and then adding up the score for the year. Then, we award trophies based on



the number of entrants per class. A contestant may only win a trophy in one class even if participating in multiple classes. Only AROSC members are eligible for year-end trophies. Finally, a competitor must enter at least two events over the course of the year to be eligible for year-end trophies. Here are the winners:


