

Mostly Ramblings of Il Presidente!

This months ramblings were supposed to be a joyful recounting of Concorso Italiano 2004 and the beautiful evening spent on Mt. Wilson viewing the splendors of a clear summer sky and the lights of the LA basin. Unfortunately this has been overshadowed by the untimely passing of one of our great Alfisti, Charlie Thieriot. For many years Charlie was the heart and soul of AROSC and helped create, develop and nurture what has become one of the best car club competition programs in America. An open house hosted by his wife Deb was attended by what appeared to be over a hundred of Charlie's friends and associates. Charlie, to say the least, was known as a bit of a character (in the good sense) and I'm sure that the multitude of stories being told, almost all with a humorous or irreverent bent were being appreciated by Charlie in the retelling.

The Concorso Italiano weekend turned out to be close to overwhelming. The Concorso itself had around 1,000 cars on display including 550 Ferraris (with the red ones lined up as the logo for an aerial photo) and 175 Alfas. The official word from Pebble Beach is that Alfa will be the marque at the Concours d'Elegance and the very strong rumor, as of this writing, is that Alfa will be the feature Marque at Concorso Italiano 2005. During a day spent in Carmel, Evie and I walked into an art gallery that had some automotive art in the window and noticed a painting of a familiar engine style. I asked the gallery owner about the painting and he introduced me to the man who owned the car - an early 1930's 1750 with the driver's door cut down so that the diminutive driver (at the time the car was competing) could have room for his arm. Anybody guess the driver? A Nuvolari 1750 is alive and well and being driven around the Monterey Peninsular.

By the time you're reading this, you've missed our second Performance Driving School of the year, but if you notice some people with extraordinarily large smiles figure they were there. We'll have pics and a recap in the next issue.



famous 1935 German Grand Prix. The only three 2900A racers ever built, together again for the first time since their Mille Miglia success of the mid 1930s. The awesome Monoposto B, winner of Grands Prix and the Mille Miglia. The unique 2900B Le Mans Coupe. The only surviving 12C Alfa. The Disco Volante. The Fangio-winning 6C 3000CM. The incredible Alfetta, winner of the first two World Grand Prix Championships in 1950 and 1951. The multiple European Championship winning GTA and GTAm. The TZ1 and racing Giulietta and Giulia range. The 33/2 Daytona, 33/3, and TT 33/12, which took Alfa Romeo to two World Sports Car Championships in the 1970s

What makes this Alfa Romeo show such a must for the enthusiast, is that these important and valuable cars have been shipped to a series of international locations where director Tony Maylam and his production team have been able shoot the cars in action and capture them in superb widescreen photography with 'in your face' Alfa Romeo surround sound. 


# CELEBRATING OF THE LIFE OF CHARLIE THIERIOT

February 16, 1947 to August 22, 2004

Charlie's death has been very sad for all of us, but that will not be the prominent memory of Charlie to anyone who knew him. He had a sense of humor that wouldn't quit and a heart as big as his beloved Bel-Air view; perhaps it was the five cats he had at all times that made him so sweet. Personally, Charlie spent

how much he liked me and that I was as important to him as she was. I was touched that a man who was not my actual father could be so patient with me and be willing to teach me so many things.

more time with me than I ever could have asked and took me on as his own. Through thick and thin, I've struck by his side and he by mine. I've learned an abundance of things from him, all of which will always remind me of him.

At age 14, I found myself living with only my mother in Los Angeles, a year or two after a divorce and accompanying cross country move. It was then that I met a very friendly and considerate Charlie. Never having seen my mother date before, naturally I was skeptical of Charlie. On the contrary, he proved to be more of a father to me than even my real father had. I was very taken with him when he would consistently be the one who was my supervisor and companion during the 6 months with my driving permit (during which time driving was my only pastime). After only a few weeks following our first meeting, Charlie confided to my mother

What I've learned from Charlie will always be with me and the memories of learning those lessons will stay with me as well. My favorite of his many lessons was Charlie teaching me to drive a stick-shift in his own car. Several stalls and a few hours (and eventually a seized motor, which he would never admit was my fault) later I had mastered it, with Charlie laughing and smiling all the while. That lesson soon led into me driving on a genuine race-track, which Charlie lined up for me, of course.


Relatively soon thereafter, Charlie offered to send me to his old school (and also that of his father and his grandfather), St. Marks School. I happily accepted and have been grateful to him ever since for making it happen. This last summer with him I had been taking advantage of his wisdom gained from years of

engineering and professional race-car driving. Most recently, he successfully instructed me how to change my car's air intake from his chair, blind in a sense. We shared some very in-depth conversations about cars, politics, and most anything else, which often thoroughly confused everybody else.

Charlie's death has not been easy for me, nor will it be for most who knew him. Nevertheless, his memory will bring warmth to those who loved him. Already his jokes, his smile, his catch-phrases, and his laugh have brought me from tears to smiles, as I hope they will for all of you. Never again will there ever be another Charlie, and thus he will never be forgotten.




Working on the Alfa in the pits at an early Palm Springs race, Charlie and friends are doing their usual race weekend activity, other than chasing girls.



Randall Higa sent this photo of Charlie at a Spaghetti Cookoff dated March 28, 1992 that was used in an earlier newsletter.




Working on his car at home, Charlie has the usual cigarette in hand.

### Feast of San Gennaro LA

### Little Italy Meets the Grove/Farmers Market

3rd Annual "Feast of San Gennaro - LA" -- September 24-26

The Feast of San Gennaro, a beloved tradition in New York's Little Italy since the 1920s, originated in Naples, Italy and continues there to this day. Intrinsic to the tradition is the ceremonial carrying of the statue of San Gennaro from the church to the Festival. The Feast of San Gennaro LA continues this tradition with the Procession of the Saint on Saturday, September 25th, at 10:30 am from Christ the King Church at Vine & Melrose to the feast site. The general public is encouraged to take part in the procession.

Aside from establishing the Feast as a destination event, the main objectives for the Feast are to honor and increase the visibility of Italian history and culture in Los Angeles. Endorsed by both the Italian Consulate and NIAF (National Italian American Foundation), the Feast of San Gennaro LA works to showcase the best in Italian music, film, art and cuisine.

This year's event features Italian food from more than 35 of LA's top Italian restaurants, a wide selection of fine Italian wines, live music, carnival games, thrilling rides, street performers, and strolling musicians. A host of Italian-themed activities take place throughout the three days including bocce ball tournaments, grape stomps, celebrity chef demonstrations on the cooking stage, plays, live musical performances, a Kid's Corner, and the crowning of the second Miss San Gennaro. Precious Cheese and Ralph's Supermarket are main sponsors, and the celebrity hosts are Jimmy Kimmel, Adam Carolla and Tommy LaSorda.

Italian cars will be included this year as part of the cultural exposition, and in particular, Alfa Romeos. There will be space provided for 10-12 cars to be exhibited each day in a roped-off area. If you are interested in showing off your car for any part of the Festival, contact the organizers or Norman Silverman. Cars should be nice, clean daily-driver quality, although historic, specialty

or unique models, and high concours quality cars would be great.

The event has moved from Hollywood to the Grove/ Farmers Market (Grove Drive between Beverly and 3<sup>rd</sup>) and is a three-day celebration and exchange of Italian culture, art, food, and entertainment that is free to the public and fun for the whole family. All proceeds will benefit underprivileged children in the Los Angeles area. Hours are 11 am to 11 pm daily. For more information, visit www.feastofla.org.

# SEMA Show - Calling All Car Buffs

November 2-5, 2004 -- Las Vegas

The Specialty Equipment Marketing Association (SEMA) is composed of manufacturers of automotive OEM and aftermarket parts. Every year in November, they hold a show in Las Vegas in conjunction with similar organizations, such as AAIW (Automotive Aftermarket Industry Week), AAPEX (Automotive Aftermarket Products Expo), and the International Tire Expo. The combined shows occupy all three buildings of the Las Vegas Convention Center, plus the forecourt and front parking area, as well as the complete Sands Convention Center.

In 2003, the show was huge! It shattered all records in a number of categories. More than 100,000 people passed through the doors to view over 1800 exhibits, in just the LVCC. The New Product Showcase housed more than 1000 items. SEMA believes that the automotive aftermarket is about as healthy an economic indicator as there can be. If correct, the 2004 show may be even bigger!

The LVCC was organized into several product categories, and for the first time they were much more cohesively located, which reduced the walking distance to cover any given type of product. The categories were:

- Original Equipment Manufacturers (12 exhibits, 1067 booth spaces)
- Car Care & Accessories (188 exhibits in 350 booths)
- Business Services (48 exhibits, 84 booths)
- Racing & Performance (448 exhibits, 2036 booths)
- New Product Showcase
- Wheels and Performance Tires (182 exhibits, 1672 booths)
- Tools & Equipment (37 exhibits, 60 booths)

Also, if you register as a buyer, you can get a card to swipe at the exhibits for info to be mailed to you, and you will probably get the SEMA News magazine delivered monthly, with the latest products and info. The deadline for \$10 advance registration is October 22. The price goes up to \$50 after that, and it is advisable to pre-register to avoid the on-site hassle. If you register before October 1, they will mail your badge to you; otherwise you go to will call to pick it up.

We're headed back up north to tour the Paso Robles area. We were up there in May and you wouldn't believe how many new wineries have popped up since we were there in 2001.






