

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## **Toyo Introduces New Competition Tire**

New cars are great. With ever increasing sophistication they coddle us not only from the rigors of the road or track, but are also designed to work well with a wide variety of aftermarket equipment. Older cars aren't like this. Maybe they didn't work so well to begin with in light of modern cars, but I've found that changing anything on them is relayed loud and clear to the occupants.

What does this have to do with tires? Well, having owned and tracked my Alfa Milano Verde for years, I'd always been on the lookout for that ideal combination of performance and comfort. The Alfa is a great testbed because it doesn't hide anything from you.

3 sets of tires ago, I came across the T1S. The civility combined with excellent grip and stellar feedback were far beyond my expectations of a maximum performance tire. The ride was smooth. It was quiet. Grip was considerable and polished with a smooth break-away. One of the most enticing features was the "talkative" nature of the T1S. It told you about the road texture, available grip, and even your alignment specs.

It may seem strange that I'm telling you about a tire that is about to be discontinued, but I'm telling you about it to establish a benchmark.

Toyo has a new tire on the horizon. It's called the T1R. Toyo was kind enough to invite me to the launch of the new T1R. After a delicious breakfast and a tech talk, we adjourned to the runways turned into racetracks at El Toro Marine base in Southern California. Danny McKeever's

race school provided us with race prepped Celicas with exceptionally neutral handling to best discern the improvements Toyo has labored over for so long. The Celicas were shod with both the T1R and the T1S. Toyo set up two tracks on which to test and compare both the old and new tires. One was a slow tight autocross type course, while the other was a high speed autocross/short track style course.

At first it was hard to tell the difference, with other

journalists sharing laps. However, gale-like Santa Ana winds blew up and wore down all but the hard core track junkies. We diehards took advantage of the increased track time. Our initial impression was that we liked the T1S better. However, on the fast track where we could get a rhythm flowing and run repeated non-stop laps, the T1R started to shine. Yes, the lower speed talkative nature of the S was gone, but in its place was a newfound confidence at speed that warms any racer's heart.

If there was one fault with the S, it was the soft sidewall that was responsible for the quiet cushy ride. You'd toss the car into a corner and have to trust the mechanical grip

since the input and feedback could be a little rubbery at the hairy limit. Now keep in mind I'm talking about entering turn 8 at Willow Springs at 100+ miles per hour with the car slowly drifting sideways to the edge of the track, not your usual daily commute. The R provides quicker, more detailed information at the limit thanks to a new shoulder design \*(insert picture of new tire) that allows for more subtle adjustments via the throttle and steering wheel.

Music to a gearhead's ears! So the new R takes away that





rubbery feeling while providing even more grip and quicker responses.

Testing has been done on some of the most challenging race track circuits in the world, including the Nurburgring – in the rainy season no less! The V shaped grooves channel water away form the center of the contact patch, while the new shoulder blocks provide newfound stability on the limits. Channels are cut to varying depths to improve the footprint in both wet and dry, while buttressing the shoulder blocks for less heat buildup and reducing wear over time. This is the perfect all around street and track tire for somebody who is very competitive and yet doesn't want the hassles of swapping wheels and tires at the track.


The wear rating has increased, both wet and dry grip have been increased, and noise levels have fallen to even lower levels on both new and worn tires. Wet braking distances have improved by almost 15 feet when stopping from 60mph. The T1S was already one of the lightest weight street tires on the market. The R continues this tradition, providing low unsprung weight for improved handling. What's not to like?

People with lightweight cars like Miatas or those who never go beyond 9/10ths might miss the communication of he S at lower speeds. It's still a great a tire, even if going away by summer's end. Toyo's T1 line has always been about max performance and the T1R makes very few and perfectly acceptable trade-offs for people looking for a tire that can provide civility on the street and performance at the track. Yes, there are other tires that match the T1R in individual performance factors, but none that do so many things so well.

I left the event, charging down the wide, smooth, banked on-ramps and off-ramps of Southern California on my T1S, salivating at the thought of the improvements the T1R would bring both on the track and on the street. The 400 mile journey back to Northern California, was spent plotting back to back testing of the new R against some other street tires at future Alfa driving events, as the S has proven itself capable of matching times with the highly regarded competition.

Toyo is increasing its commitment to the North American market by building a factory here. Look for the new T1R to arrive this summer in an ever increasing range of sizes from 14 inch to 21 inch in aspect ratios of 55 to 25.

Also on hand were the very hot and very charming drifting champs Ken Gushi and Eiji "Tarzan" Yamada. Ken who



displayed impressive control of everything from a prototype supercharged Mustang to a Nissan S13 (240SX to civilians) and turbo S2K. Tarzan was prevented from giving a full demonstration of his prowess due to technical difficulties with the Viper GT, and so made due with a forced induction G35 coupe. Both graciously regaled us with tales of adventures both on and off track. \*(insert pictures of Ken and Toyo girls)












### **Monterey Historics and Concorso Italiano**

As mentioned last month, although it is still very early to be thinking about August, if you want to participate in the fun weekend known as the Monterey Historics YOU NEED TO START MAKING PLANS NOW!

The weekend officially starts on Friday August 19 with the 20th Anniversary Concorso Italiano (CI) at the Black Horse Golf Course in Fort Ord, Monterey. The new owners of CI have hired professional traffic engineers who have promised that traffic flow will be greatly improved over the last two years. Featured marques are Alfa Romeo and the Lamborghini Miura, so your car will be among those honored at the event. Once again this year, your car club (the Alfa Romeo Association, that is) will be presenting an After-Concorso Cocktail Party in the clubhouse at the Black Horse that will be a featured event for those who participate. We will be having hot hoer d'euvres from a carving station as well as two drink tickets per adult participant. Tickets are priced at \$25 for the cocktail party and you can be sure it will be worth it. Concorso Italiano has increased the price for entrants to \$75 this year (up from \$50 last year) and that only holds until the end of May; in June it becomes \$100, July \$160, and after that \$250 per car! So it will be very expensive to delay after May to enter, but it's still cheaper to enter a car with two persons than being a spectator that starts at \$70 each and goes to \$100 the day of the event. Any car will do, just clean it up to be as presentable as you can make it, as long as it's not a junker.

Once again we are going to take race ticket orders and obtain corral passes for ARA and AROC members for the Saturday, Aug 20 and Sunday, Aug 21 Historic Races at Laguna Seca. BUT: The firm cutoff date this year for ticket/corral pass orders (determined by the race organizers) is Monday June 27, 2005. This means that all orders from you need to be in our hands by SATURDAY JUNE 25. We realize that this is almost two months before the date of the event, but it is not ours to control. So if you wish to be there and get corral passes, you really must plan ahead. One good thing about the race tickets is that prices are the same as last year. Forms for ordering tickets, corral passes, rooms at the Laurel Inn and dinners at Gino's are in the May and June issues of the Overheard Cams.

Again this year, our counterparts at Delta Sierra AROC have arranged for a block of rooms at the Laurel Inn in Salinas at very competitive rates, as well as organizing the Alfa Romeo Dinner at Gino's (also in Salinas) on Saturday night. The order blank mentioned above (see it on another page in the Cams) has a segment for reserving rooms and dinner seats. That portion of the order blank is to be returned to James Treadwell at Delta Sierra along with payment for those items. Race ticket, corral pass and cocktail party orders (the upper part of the order form) and payment are to be returned to John Maclay of ARA.

One other item needs to be emphasized: Last year we had far too many requests for corral passes from people who obtained race tickets elsewhere and asked us to provide them with a corral pass. This year the chances of our obtaining extra corral passes are very slim and it is likely that we will be unable to provide corral passes to anybody if they did not order tickets through ARA auspices. If you order race tickets through ARA, you will get corral passes; if you get tickets any other way we will be unable to provide a corral pass. The ticket doesn't cost any more through ARA than elsewhere and is cheaper than at the door, so take advantage of your ARA ticket agent (and get a corral pass in the process)!



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

- From the north or west, proceed east of the I-405/I-605 interchange for about 2 miles; get into the far right lane looking for the 22 FWY exit from the 405, and exit onto Bolsa Chica Road from that interchange. ### **BRAILLE RALLYE 2005**

Saturday, July 16

It's hard to believe that another year has passed and it is again time for the Braille Rallye! For those who have participated in the past, it is an opportunity to renew friendships and rivalries. For those of you who are joining us for the first time, welcome! We hope you become a regular.

The Braille Rallye was begun over 30 years ago as an incentive for visually challenged students to study and to grow confident in reading Braille. Each student must qualify by meeting established reading goals before they can compete as a navigator.

Up to 60 student navigators from Braille Institute Youth Centers all over Southern California compete in a standard sports car rally, teaming with drivers from sports car clubs, law enforcement, media, and just regular folks.

The actual rally is very straightforward. The driver/navigator team must get from checkpoint to checkpoint at the proper speed to attain the correct elapsed time. The directions are written in Braille or large print and are given to the driver by the navigator. You, the driver, have no idea where you are going; the challenge is for your navigator to read the instructions properly and to communicate those instructions clearly to you. These students, like any other California teenager, would like the independence of driving their own car. That cannot happen, but in this event, they are more than just a passenger. As a driver, completely dependent on your navigator, you will find a team partner and friend, and a day not easily forgotten.

Rallye participants should reach the final checkpoint between 1 and 2 PM. There is a luncheon and awards presentation at the end and the event concludes by about 4 PM.

This is a NON-SPECTATOR event. All the attention is directed towards the navigators. They are the competitors. They will receive the trophies and the cheers. We do invite the media so they can report on the activity and the remarkable capabilities of these young people.

There is a \$10 Entrance Fee to help defer the costs of the event. The fee is payable the day of the event.

You will receive an entry confirmation package. This will contain a copy of General Rally Instructions and Sample Rally Instructions.

For those donating their time for this event, it is very rewarding to know that the Braille institute reports that this is their primary "fun" event promoting reading skills.


### Spring Tour Kicks it Up a Notch













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




