



## **Keeping it Cool**

Now that Summer is fully entrenched in our region (vengefully so, in some locations) you might want to pay attention to keeping your engine cool. And by that I don't mean a chrome air cleaner and fluorescent pink hoses. I'm talking about the engine's cooling system and using the proper coolant.

Most engines are water cooled, and one would think that straight tap water would be called for - it was for quite a while, however, tap water has a few drawbacks. The first is that when it gets below 32° F it freezes and has a somewhat unique characteristic in that it also expands which, in an enclosed space (like an engine) can cause the engine to crack. The minerals in water can also cause corrosion of engine parts and distilled water was recommended to prevent the corrosion caused by the minerals. Eventually alcohol was added to water to lower the freezing point, but that had its own corrosion issues.

In 1926, ethylene glycol was first used as an automotive antifreeze. Out here in the southwestern United States, freezing weather is not quite the problem as it is in the northern states, so it took years until antifreeze became the default coolant. Also, over time, the name changed from just antifreeze to "antifreeze-coolant".

Trivia note: Ethylene glycol is used as a replacement for glycerol in the manufacturing of dynamite.

Of course, today's antifreeze does not just keep your cooling system from freezing, it also raises the boiling point of the coolant and contains chemicals to reduce corrosion and rust in the cooling system.

Today there are a wide variety of coolants to choose from. There three types of antifreeze-coolants used today: Inorganic Acid Technology, Organic Acid Technology and Hybrid Organic Acid Technology.

It should also be noted that coolant (antifreeze) come in various colors. The colors are just dyes to keep the coolant from looking like potable water and to help identify the different formulations of the coolant.

Inorganic Acid Technology (IAT) coolant is usually ethylene glycol or propylene glycol and is used in automobiles up to the 1990s. It was to be replaced about every two years.

Organic Acid Technology (OAT) coolant is usually pink, orange, bright red, blue and dark green. It does not contain silicates or phosphates, but it does contain additives to prevent corrosion and rust and is usually good for 10 years.

Hybrid Organic Acid Technology (HOAT) coolant is like OAT coolant but contains silicates to increase protection of aluminum. It comes in yellow, turquoise, pink, blue or purple.

You should neither mix different types of coolant in your car's system nor even keep to the same color - the formulations can be different, and the additives may counteract each other. You should check your car's owner's manual for the proper type of coolant (antifreeze) for your vehicle. Prestone and Peak sell coolant (antifreeze) labeled as domestic, Asian and European, and produced in various colors so you should be able to find what you need for your car.


When you buy coolant, you can get either get a concentrate or a prediluted 50/50 mix. If you get the prediluted mix you can just pour it in. If you get the concentrate, you need to mix it 50/50 with distilled water. Do not use tap water as it contains salts and minerals that you do not want in your cooling system.

Unless you know the exact capacity of your car's cooling system or you premix the concentrate with distilled water first, it is probably easiest to just get the 50/50 mix.

There are also "lifetime" coolants that are supposed to last the lifetime of the vehicle, but given that we tend to hang on to our Alfas, will lifetime coolant in your Stelvio still be good after 50 years?

Now that you know everything you need about coolant maybe at the next concorso we can add a coolant inspection the judging sheet.
